VALETE

I will spread the farewells over my two remaining letters of the year.

- Dan Druce joined the Maths department in 2016 as a newly qualified teacher. He has been very highly regarded within the Department and has also supported the School through leading a rugby team and working as a boarding tutor. Dan wishes to live in London and has secured a post at an independent school in Richmond.
- **Emma Watson** has been with us for but a short time, though the impact through her excellent teaching has been immense. We wish her well as she moves to Headington School, much nearer to her Oxfordshire home.
- Cathie Wells joined RGS in 2014. A most highly regarded, even 'sought after' teacher at all levels, Cathie has inspired many hundreds of mathematicians during her time with us. Sadly, for the profession, Cathie is leaving teaching, though for her this opens an exciting new chapter. The narrative has been that Cathie was 'doing a PhD in weather forecasting'. So, to set the record straight here are her plans: following a one year MRes course, Cathie will be undertaking a three year PhD at the Mathematics of Planet Earth Centre (jointly run by Imperial and Reading). The PhD will involve creating a new dynamical system of partial differential equations in order to better predict the location and severity of extreme weather events.
- **John Russell** has been our Estates and Facilities Manager since 2013. During John's tenure, there have been a number of significant estate developments in addition to the daily routine of maintaining a site which operates (on a very small budget) to serve the needs of 1,500 people. ROYAL CHARTER

Somehow, the RGS Royal Charter from 1562, signed by Queen Elizabeth I, has survived, despite not having been particularly well looked after. In recent years, it has been pinned to a wall in a small office in School House. An RGS family, Sara and Sam Littlewood, who have two sons at the school, have very kindly resourced the restoration and professional casing of the Charter. It looks fantastic and is a really important part of RGS history which all should see. The restorer was Victoria Stevens, ACR from Victoria Stevens Conservation, who has taken great care and pride in restoring the document to its former Elizabethan glory. I cannot express adequately enough how grateful I am for this project which has been carried out in memory of Mr Littlewood's mother. The Charter will be on display at Prize Giving tonight and tomorrow.

You will recall that I wrote to you last year forewarning you all that our position in the league tables would be affected by our historic preference for IGCSE English Language and Literature. This turned out to be the case and our upturn in GCSE results was rewarded with a 'bottom of the league' position as IGCSEs did not count. The point about last year was that we were 'so low' it was ridiculous. This year, with our very last IGCSE having been sat in English Literature only, we will be somewhere 'mid table'. The DfE are aware of our situation and understand it, though they have expressed their expectation that we move back fully to standard GCSE, which we are doing with next year's Year 11. You will no doubt have seen in the press that the IGCSE remains popular with the independent sector and there has been considerable discussion about two systems of qualification and its fairness regarding university entrance. We are confident of another good set of GCSE results this year.

SKI TRIP PRAISE

It is not unusual for us to hear great things about the conduct of our boys on school trips. However, it was a great delight for Mrs Smith (who has led the trip for many years) to receive a certificate in recognition of the exemplary behaviour of our boys whilst staying at the resort. We expect no less, but it is great to have recognition.

ACTIVITY DAYS

These have become a part of the 'fixture list' for many schools and not only enrich the boys' education but also 'ring the changes' post End of Year exams. They take a lot of organising and an immense amount of good will is given by staff who are taken away from their usual work to accompany trips and the like. Year 7 enjoyed a medieval day with costume drama and birds of prey, followed by a French play; Year 8 juggled hoops, rode on unicycles and circus training; Year 9 learned how to save a life with emergency first aid training; geographers used the opportunity to fulfil a practical aspect of their GCSE assignment (non-Geographers went to Cadbury World) and the Sixth Form benefitted from Higher Education seminars and talks. A couple of other trips to Harry Potter World and Warwick Castle rounded off an excellent couple of days.
