

HEADMASTER'S LETTER 15 July 2019



Dear Parent

VALETE

We are saying goodbye to five members of the teaching staff.

David Holmes has taught Maths with us as a Newly Qualified Teacher, on a one-year contract. We wish him well as he moves to a permanent post at Aylesbury Grammar School.

Ben Berryman, Master in charge of Cricket, is moving to Taunton to take up a post there. Cricket at RGS has moved forward during his tenure and his organisational skills (Bat Oar Ball, for example) will be missed.

Jamie Rizk is moving to an international school in Cairo. Jamie has thrown himself fully into the life of the School leading on Maths initiatives, the CCF and Master in charge of Chess.

Clive Greenhough joined RGS in 2003 on a joint role with World Challenge, ultimately assuming the role of Director of Co-Curricular Activities. The Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, trips and expeditions have grown considerably during this time. Clive was also in charge of the Royal Navy section of the CCF and taught Business Studies and Economics. Clive and his family relocated to Bath a few years ago and he has decided now to make his working life down there too.

Eric Wolton joined RGS in 1992 as Head of Biology progressing to Assistant Head. He stepped down from his leadership role a few years ago but has continued as a much respected teacher of Biology and as Professional Tutor for NQTs, trainees and staff new to the school. His annual 'Jeans for Genes' band performances have raised around £30,000 over the years. Eric is retiring and we wish him well.

The RGS Rowing Club has grown by a third in the last year, bolstered by the latest intake in Year 8. We have been working with our new coaching team to design a programme for 2019/2020 and will start with a camp at the end of August. WHAT DO POINTS MAKE?...

I was very pleased to congratulate boys in Year 7 who had been awarded the highest number of points this academic year (between 150-200 points in total). Boys who achieve 100 points meet with the Deputy Headmaster and those who achieve 60 points meet with the Assistant Head responsible for the House. A couple of comments in the survey asked 'how many points represents 'good?'. Not a simple answer, I'm afraid. Year 7 always achieve the most and there is a gentle decline as boys progress through the School. Their application is currently discretionary and perhaps subjective. This contrasts with behaviour points which are enshrined within a Behaviour Policy and therefore more easily applied. We will be looking into this in greater detail in September.

PRIZES!

We were delighted to welcome Sir Christopher Hum and OW Tom Ravenscroft as our guest speakers for Senior and Junior Prizegiving respectively. Many thanks to the trustees of the RGS Foundation, the Parents' Association and a number of families who generously donate prizes each year. DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD

Mr Wallace presented around 120 bronze awards in an assembly last week and we had 74 boys undertaking the silver and gold expedition in Brecon a weekend or two ago. You will also recall that 17 boys received their gold awards at Buckingham Palace in May. This is an exceptional record in this highly regarded qualification which really does encourage young people to acquire skills for life.
