FESTIVAL OF LESSONS AND CAROLS

Over 200 students participated as choristers, instrumentalists or readers. With a congregation of over 300, All Saints Church was filled with festive singing. GIVING

My final assembly of the calendar year was on the topic of 'giving'. I'm very pleased to report that this term our students and staff have donated £200 to a school in Sierra Leone, towards a vegetable garden project, £1300 to the Royal British Legion (Poppy Appeal), £1200 to [The Molly Rose Foundation](#) and over £2000 to Save the Children. Finally, we have been very pleased to receive food goods for the One Can Trust, a local Food Bank service, fortified by around £400 of donations from the retiring collection at the end of the Carol Service. MOBILE 'PHONES

We are very much aware of the increasing pressure to implement total bans, and we have noted that several schools in Bucks have recently taken this approach. I hope that you have taken time to read the Deputy Headmaster's letter on this important topic. We have decided not to implement a total smartphone ban, instead focusing on developing students' 'digital agency'—the responsible and safe use of technology - to prepare them for a digital future. Our strict school rule remains that phones must not be seen between 08:40 and 15:30, but we also emphasise a vital home-school partnership for managing devices outside of school hours. The letter outlines essential guidance and resources, including the crucial need for parents to set and monitor restrictions on devices at home. The Webinar on the impact of technology on the teenage brain, was well attended by over 250 parents - a sure and certain sign of their interest in this important matter.
