I would only note that, as a school that strives to be the best state school at rugby in the country, winning a national title for the first time since many people can remember is a sign that we are achieving what we are aspiring to - our Senior Squad won the Continental Tyres National Schools Plate Final beating



Barnard Castle 27-24 having beaten well-known rugby schools like Epsom College and Monmouth along the way.

Also, for the first time since 2018 (when our Y11s had just passed their 11+!) we again have a tour for next year's Senior Squad (this year's Year 11/12). It has been tradition that the Senior Squad tours every two years but, due to COVID, the 2020 tour will now take place in 2023. We wish our tourists well and this 'trip of a lifetime' is something every RGS rugby player can aspire to.

On the fundraising front, we had a hugely enjoyable Burns Night at the end of January. Thanks to some very generous donations and bidding in the auction, we raised over £8,500 on the night and everyone had a great time. There was also a very enjoyable FRORGS Junior Awards evening for Y7-9 that did much to foster the bonds that makes rugby at RGS so special.
