



STANDARDS OF BEHAVIOUR

We expect all students to comply with all the relevant School policies, rules and procedures. For the students these can be found on the school website and CloudBox. We would ask all parents to read the School's Behaviour Policy which is on the RGS website.

We also expect:

1. Good behaviour is expected of the Royal Grammar School pupils at all times and in all places. Remember, when you wear the school uniform, you represent the school; on the school premises, on school and public transport, on sporting occasions and on school visits.
2. You should be proud of the school uniform, which gives you a tidy appearance. You should wish to wear it correctly in school, and to and from school and on the occasions noted above.
3. Good manners are the mark of a responsible and mature person. You should be polite and courteous to one another, to staff and other adults and particularly to visitors to the school.
4. We expect you to conduct yourself at all times with honesty, humility, integrity and respect.
5. You should help keep good order in the school by entering and leaving classrooms quietly, without running, by using corridors and staircases in single file, walking on the left and by giving way at doorways, entrances and exits. You should always allow staff or other adults to go first.
6. You should be punctual and regular in your attendance. These qualities are important in later life and are recorded on your reports.
7. In the classroom, you should work conscientiously with or without constant supervision. In supervised private study periods, normal classroom discipline applies.
8. Homework is a vital part of your studies and should be recorded in your Homework Diary and conscientiously completed. You should also try to develop personal study habits.
9. You should be careful of school property, both buildings and equipment. These things belong to us all and their replacement or repair can cost you or your parents' money, either directly or indirectly.
10. Personal property is your responsibility. Mark all your belongings clearly with your name.

It is in your best interests to be as fully involved as possible in the life of the school. In this way, you can develop as a person and contribute to the school community. So take up an interest in a sport, a club or a society, represent your House in the varied activities and be prepared to take a position of responsibility if offered to you.
