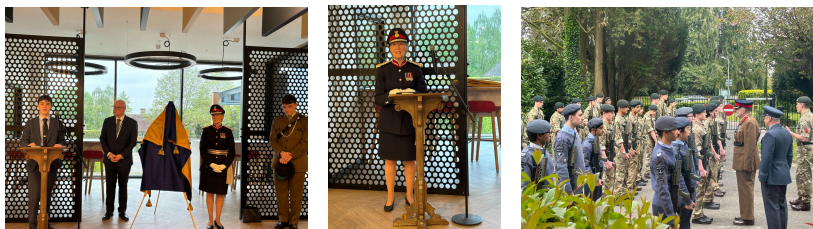


HEADMASTER'S LETTER

Dear Parent

'In this transitory life'
