# Ukraine

Following some helpful charity advice, we made the decision to support the British Red Cross as our part in supporting Ukrainian families, rather than collecting and sending goods. To complement our weekly benevolent fund which itself raises many thousands of pounds, boys have given generously to this extra collection.

# CCF

The CCF is an integral part of RGS. We regularly have 140-160 boys who gain excellent skills and enormous joy from their participation. Year 9 have the opportunity to sign up and to benefit from this great experience.

Last week from Thursday to Sunday, 20 boys from the CCF travelled to the Brecon Beacons to take part in Adventure Training. They rock climbed and abseiled on Friday in quarries above Merthyr Tydfil. On the Saturday the group went caving and gorge walking, the latter a thoroughly exhilarating experience. On Sunday they practised their navigation skills in upland terrain with some boys reaching a mountain summit at 725 meters. Throughout the boys were responsible for their own cooking and cleaning in a bunkhouse. Although the experiences were occasionally disconcerting for some boys, the whole event aimed to push the boys in unfamiliar activities and it is to their credit that they showed great courage in embracing the sometimes daunting challenges. They also learnt a great deal about teamwork and personal administration while cleaning and cooking for themselves, all important life-skills that the CCF looks to impart. # Fencing - RGS at the Public Schools Fencing Championships

Last week, 24 fencers from Years 9 – 13 travelled down to the Lee Valley Athletics Centre in Enfield to compete in the Public Schools Fencing Championships, a competition that draws together many of the best fencers in the country. Our highest-placed finisher over the three days of competition was Sam Holden in Year 12, who finished 12<sup>th</sup> in the Senior Boys sabre competition and still has a year to run in his age-group. Several of our younger fencers also showed great promise. Kai Rancurel and Jasper Tong (both Year 9) put together strong runs in the foil. Kai made it through to the last 16 of the foil and narrowly missed out on reaching the same stage of the epee competition after losing 15-14 in the last 32. Alex Stewart in Year 10 also impressed in the Junior sabre by winning his second-round group then progressing to the last 16 after winning an all-RGS battle against fellow RGS sabreur Max Littlewood in the round of 32. Other fencers who reached the last 32 in their weapons were Captain of Fencing George Hill (Year 13), and Aaron Tecke and Ben Kirby (both Year 11). Congratulations to all who took part representing the School after two years away from competition due to Covid.

Away from the PSFCs, separate congratulations also go to Sam (Bronze medal), Ben (Bronze medal) and Alex (Gold medal) for finishing highly in the sabre section of the Southern Regional Fencing heats to qualify for the finals of the British Youth Championships in May.

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# Hockey (update from Mr Clark)

- U16A's reached the last 8 of the National Cup, losing out to The Leys School in their quarter-final
- 1<sup>st</sup> XI reached the last 16 of National Plate

- U13's made it to the South Cup finals, just missing out on the semi-finals and the chance to go to Nationals
- Two Y12's, Oscar Neil-Dwyer and LJ Ekendahl, have been selected to take part in DiSE programme delivered by England Hockey & Loughborough College to help high performing hockey players pursue sporting excellent alongside full-time education.

All of this is off the back of two highly disrupted school hockey seasons and shows how well the boys have done working hard and staying focused in their training and games.
