HOUSE MUSIC

The House System has been in place for around four years with House Music very rapidly becoming a much looked forward to feature of the calendar. The Woodland Trust have been running a scheme to encourage schools, and others, to plant trees. We were very pleased to receive a number of saplings to grow on the School estate. An area of Uplyme field was identified and a number of Year 7 families gave of their time on Saturday morning to plan the following: 20 Grey Willow, 25 Silver Birch, 30 Wild Cherry, 5 Rowan trees, 10 Field Maple and 15 English Oak trees. By the time the boys leave the School in 2027, one of their legacies will be a small coppice with established trees. Many thanks to all who took part (so many in fact that by the time I arrived the work had been done), and specifically to Howard Yendall our Head Groundsman. He is passionate about the work he does and ensured that the trees were procured then led us through the planning procedure on his well-rotavated ground (thank goodness!). Miss Munday, having suggested that we sign up to the event, ensured that the planting crew were fed and watered by serving refreshments from the boot of her car!
