Dear Parent

Welcome back! I hope you all had a good Easter break. There were a number of religious observances for Christian, Muslim, Jewish and Sikh families and, of course, for us all it is a good opportunity for family time.

Iftar

I was very pleased to support the Iftar on Tuesday evening. There were three hundred in the Queen's Hall listening to very inspiring addresses from a number of our boys, an opportunity for prayer for those who wished and a sumptuous meal. It was so good to get members of our school community, including many former students, together for an important part of Ramadan. Many thanks to Mrs Khan for organising a superb event and to parents who donated funds and who attended on the night.

RGSHW 'Digging up the Past' A Collaboration Between the Art and History Departments - A report by Mrs Francis, Subject Leader for Art.

It all started with the discovery of the work by a little-known artist, Duncan Cameron, who was inspired by the power and narrative behind various curiosities and artefacts. Cameron produced a series of studies drawn whilst at Pitt Rivers Museum in Oxford. This captured our imagination and led the Art Department to discuss the concept of archaeological finds, artefacts, and the impact on the society at the time with the History Department. The History Department loved the concept of 'Digging up the Past' and how, by studying the various objects, the pupils could gain an understanding of perceptions and in particular the relationship with the British Empire. We created a crosscurricular project, ending with an A5 two-sided postcard, one side created during their Art lessons, and the other in History lessons.

The inspiration for this postcard was gathered on a trip to Oxford that took place just before the Easter holidays. All Year 8 attended the trip. They spent the day sketching and photographing in either the Pitt Rivers Museum or the Museum of Natural History followed by going on a walking tour around the Oxford University area of the city and including a trip up St Mary's Church tower, led by the History Department. The connection with Oxford, the objects drawn within the museum and how they inform ideas within the classroom and between subjects has been an invaluable experience to the students and one that they found incredibly enjoyable.

I know one of the clergy at The University Church of St Mary - she emailed me to say that the church staff were 'blown away' (sic) by the courtesy and sensitivity of our boys during their visit.

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Benevolent Fund

The Benevolent Fund this term is in aid of the <u>Ruth Strauss Foundation</u>. You are probably aware that Ruth was the wife of the cricketer, Andrew Strauss, until her untimely death from cancer. The charity supports families with children following the death of a parent. Mr Atkin, who is a passionate cricketer and supporter of the charity, is leading assemblies next week and will be encouraging boys to give generously to this good cause. The assembly will include a moving video; staff have been asked to be aware that boys who have lost parents during their childhood may find the video upsetting and will talk it through with them before the assembly.
