And, not to put too finer a point on it, the financial support makes all the difference to what we can provide for your sons.

The Showcase was quite exceptional. The Music Department were overwhelmed by the emails received from parents, all of whom were very proud to see their sons taking part in music of so high a standard. I have often noted the politeness of applause following a junior string ensemble performance (almost as though the audience are wearing gloves), but this was not the case last week with rich, in-tune sounds coming from young violinists, classical and choral. There was something for everyone. The Junior Choir of over 100 singers performed with great enthusiasm and we'll hear the whole choir in a few weeks' time at the Festival of Lessons and Carols. The Music Triumvirate of Messrs Mullaly, Chitham-Mosely and Mrs Tomkins (who has the understated title of Music Administrator!) have really put their mark on the department.

One issue facing music in general is that fewer and fewer young people are learning musical instruments. Whilst our numbers at RGS are high compared with many other schools, we are not getting as many boys from state primary schools arriving already playing an instrument as we might have done twenty years ago. Do encourage your sons, and most certainly if you have children of primary age to consider learning an instrument. It is both a great sociable hobby and whilst very few make it to the top, it can be a useful complementary career and income as it most certainly was for me for many years.

GOVERNMENT GUIDANCE

Please see below the message from the Department of Education. We have followed government guidance throughout the Pandemic. To this effect, unless exempt, all boys must wear masks in corridors, communal areas and on school coaches. The guidance does not, at this stage, mandate the wearing of masks in classrooms though boys may do so if they wish. Please may I remind you that boys should be testing twice-weekly (Wednesdays and Sundays).

'On Saturday 27 November, the Prime Minister <u>announced</u> new temporary measures following the emergence of the Omicron variant of COVID-19 in the UK.

The new measures will be introduced as a precaution to slow down the spread of the variant while we gather more information. We will continue to keep this under review as the situation develops.

Face coverings

Face coverings should be worn in communal areas in all settings by staff, visitors and pupils or students in year 7 and above, unless they are exempt.

Pupils or students (in year 7 or above) should continue to wear face coverings on public and dedicated school transport, unless they are exempt.

Testing

All educational and childcare settings should continue to encourage staff and students to test twice weekly using lateral flow device (LFD) tests.'
